### 15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

Cachar College has been offering courses under the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) for its TDC program and has taken the necessary initiatives to implement courses under the National Education Policy 2020 (NEP-2020) structure for FYUG programs from the session 2023-24. With a strong emphasis on interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary education, the college ensures that students are equipped with the skills needed for the global job market and nurtures their interest in various fields through the following initiatives:

1. The college itself is a multidisciplinary institution

- having natural science, social sciences, humanities, commerce and management, each offering multiple subjects.
- 2. Under the CBCS system, it is compulsory for the students to study at least one Generic Elective (GE) subject, in a discipline different from their major. In the same manner, the Ability Enhancement Compulsory (AEC) course is a mandatory component of the curriculum for all students. As a part of which they study one language paper in first semester and Environmental Studies in the second semester.
- 3. In the Four Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUGP), it will be compulsory for the students to undertake three Interdisciplinary Course (IDC) papers: IDC-101, IDC-151, and IDC-201, in the first, second, and third semesters, respectively.
- 4. In the FYUGP along with IDC, a student majoring in a particular discipline (DSC) have to choose ten Discipline Specific Minors (DSM), two Value-Added Courses (VAC), three Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC), and four Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC) in any discipline of their choice.
- 5. Offerings of multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary subjects, along with VAC (Yoga, NCC, NSS, Understanding India and EVS), SEC, and AEC, is essential for holistic education, equipping our students for both their professional pursuits and advanced academic endeavors.

#### 16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The implementation of the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) holds significant importance for the student community, particularly under the multiple entry and exit provisions outlined in the NEP 2020 guidelines to be implemented from the ensuing session. Over the past year, the affiliating University of Cachar College has mandated the creation of ABC IDs for all students enrolled under the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) and the Four Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUGP) as per NEP-2020 directives. This allows seamless credit transfer and accumulation across various courses, disciplines, and institutions.

#### 17.Skill development:

Cachar College employs a blend of in-curriculum and extracurricular involvement to enrich skill development, offering students a plethora of choices for Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) and programs.

1. In the three-year degree course (TDC) it is compulsory to

- study two SEC papers for Honours students and four SEC papers for General students.
- 2. In the CBCS structure, field studies/ academic tours/ excursions/ project works/ assignments are a part of the curriculum. This complements academic learning by offering practical experiences that contribute to the holistic development of students' skills, preparing them for future career endeavors.
- 3. Additionally, students can hone their skills beyond academic boundaries through engagement in workshops, training programs, etc. offered by Cachar College. For example, a workshop on advanced excel and web designing was conducted by the Department of Commerce.
- 4. In the upcoming Four Year Undergraduate Programme (NEP 2020), it will be compulsory for a student to study three SEC theory papers along with practicals.

### 18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

Efforts are consistently made by the college to incorporate Indian knowledge systems into the comprehensive growth of students.

- 1. Though the medium of teaching is English, but teachers also use Bengali, Hindi and Manipuri as additional modes of communication with students. This not only preserves indigenous knowledge but also fosters a deeper understanding and appreciation of the subject matter.
- 2. The College has six well-established language departments which are running courses on Bengali, English, Hindi, Manipuri, Arabic, and Sanskrit.
- 3. The department of Sanskrit frequently organizes workshops on typing and speaking in Sanskrit. Through this initiative, the department endeavours to contribute towards the preservation and promotion of Sanskrit as a living language in contemporary society.
- 4. To promote the Indian Knowledge System, the college observes special days such as International Yoga Day, Teachers' Day, Hindi Divas, Rabindra Jayanti, Sharad Utsav, and more.
- 5. The syllabi for English, Hindi, History, Sanskrit, Philosophy, Political Science, Bengali, and Botany (Ethnobotany) are enriched with a considerable number of topics

- pertaining to Indian culture and tradition.
- 6. Each year, the Annual College Week function hosts cultural events that actively engage students in showcasing the vibrant diversity and traditions of Indian culture.
- 7. The college boasts a vibrant drama club named "Rangashala," dedicated to celebrating our rich cultural heritage. It aims to host workshops, competitions, etc. to inculcate the spirit of our cultural traditions in the students.

#### 19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

- In pursuit of excellence and continual improvement, our institution has embraced the paradigm of Outcome-Based Education (OBE) as a cornerstone of our educational philosophy.
- 2. With a steadfast commitment to fostering holistic development and ensuring the relevance of our programs in a rapidly evolving world, the College has prioritized the implementation of OBE principles across all academic disciplines through meticulous curriculum design. The affiliating university (Assam University, Silchar) has a well-established of Board of Under Graduate Studies (BUGS) comprising faculty members from colleges and university design curriculum based on OBE principles as per NEP-2020.
- 3. The course outcomes (COs) for all courses and program outcomes (POs) are well structured in the curriculum designed as per NEP-2020. This curricular system also includes well-defined papers such as Ability Enhancement Compulsory Course (AECC), and Skill Enhancement Course (SEC) that provide students with skills to supplement what they learn from the core papers.
- 4. The College is planning to introduce a significant number of add-on courses as per the demand of students and local industries in the next academic session. Proposals for courses on tea cultivation, industrial microbiology, etc. are placed before the authority for approval.

#### 20.Distance education/online education:

- 1. Cachar College hosts the Study Centre of Krishna Kanta Handique State Open University (KKHSOU), offering a variety of undergraduate and postgraduate courses through Open & Distance Learning.
- 2. The college is equipped with technological infrastructure to support teaching and learning for online and distance courses. Significant numbers of classrooms are equipped with projection systems and internet facilities, for

- conducting classes/lectures in online/virtual platforms.
- 3. The campus provides free internet service, facilitating easy access to educational portals. Campus-wide WiFi facility further enables students to access open learning resources conveniently from any location within the college premises.
- 4. Encouraging a dynamic academic environment, the college actively promotes faculty-led seminars, conferences, and talks in online or blended mode. A significant number of the faculty has undergone successful faculty development programs on online platforms to enhance their teaching methodologies.
- 5. Looking ahead, the college is strategizing to introduce a diverse range of add-on courses in the online mode, reflecting its commitment to adapt and evolve in the educational landscape.

#### effective curriculum delivery:

- 1. Define Learning Objectives: In the first step, the learning objective for each course or subject is defined. This includes what knowledge, skills, and attitudes students are expected to gain by the end of the course.
- 2. Develop Curriculum: Being an affiliated college, Cachar College does not design or develop the curriculum, instead college follows the curriculum designed by the Assam University, Silchar.
- 3. Instructional Strategies: Methods like classroom teaching, interactive sessions, group-centered approach like group work discussions etc. and problem-based learning approach are among the few strategies that departments adopt to facilitate effective learning. However, the choice of instructional strategies depends on subject or course.
- 4. Monitor and Evaluate: Regular monitoring and evaluation are conducted to ensure that the curriculum is being delivered effectively. This includes internal assessment, term-end examination and analyzing student performance data, and making necessary adjustments in the instructional strategies.
- 5. Document and Communicate: The curriculum delivery process is be well-documented and communicated the students, teachers, and administrators. This includes sharing the curriculum, lesson plans, worksheets etc., as well as communicating any changes or updates to the curriculum.

mandatory unit tests in each semester and submits the best mark to the university within the stipulated date. The admission of UG first-semester students is completed before July, and other semester admissions are generally completed within seven days after the semester-end exams. The odd-semester classes start in the first week of August, and even semester classes start after the completion of odd-semester exams. The institution takes special care of weak and needy students. The institution strictly follows the relevant rules and regulations for examinations to curb unfair means. The internal examinations are held as per the academic calendar and internal marks are uploaded to the university's web portal. Attendance is vital, and the institution follows the affiliating university's attendance rules, with provisions for awarding marks in practical exams based on attendance percentage.

### 1.3 - Curriculum Enrichment

### 1.3.1 - Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

The institute follows the curriculum prescribed by the affiliating University. The curriculum incorporates a variety of course content that effectively integrates cross-cutting issues such as gender, environment and sustainability, human values, and professional ethics with a view to enhance professional competencies and inculcate gender, social, and human values and environment sensitivity etc. resulting in a strong value-based holistic development of the students.

Environment studies: All UG programs contain a mandatory course on Environmental Studies. Also, Zoology and Botany cover several topics on environment and sustainability in their course content. Integrating these crosscutting issues into the curriculum can help students develop a more holistic understanding of the world around them, and better prepare them for their future roles as professionals and global citizens.

Gender: Course content of English, Bengali, Manipuri and Sanskrit Honours and Pass includes texts dealing with issues like gender discrimination, the status of women in society, women's rights, and gender equality. The syllabus of Political Science and Philosophy also incorporates topics on women in politics, gender justice, feminist ethics, etc.

Human values and ethics: These topics are incorporated in the syllabus of Philosophy and Sanskrit. Professional ethics are a part of the curriculum of Commerce UG Course which deals with entrepreneurship development, goal setting- problems and prospects, the role of regulatory institutions, challenges in financial management, and their solutions.

#### 2.5 - Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 - Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode. Write description within 200 words.

Being one of the affiliated colleges of Assam University, Silchar, Cachar College follows the examination guidelines which are set and prescribed by the Controller of Examinations of the University. As part of the CBCS (Choice Based Credit System) curriculum, the University makes a provision of Internal Assessment (IA) of 20 marks. The marks of IAs are then uploaded by the examination cell to the University's examination module. The University maintains an online examination portal for each registered student, through which they can check their results as and when declared.

Two such IAs are conducted by the University per semester and the best score is considered for addition to the final results. The authority of the college assembles a committee comprising experienced teachers to design and administer the exams. Subsequently, individual departments assess the answer scripts and provide mark foils to the committee, whose marks are then uploaded onto the Affiliating University's web portal. Students have the chance to review their answer scripts, enabling them to address any grievances they may have. These measures are aimed at ensuring transparency in the internal assessment process and providing students with a fair and equitable evaluation.

Apart from these assessments, students are evaluated regularly for their performance through class tests, quizzes, Q/A sessions etc. Students are encouraged to ask about any doubts with regard to their assessment in their respective classes.

### 2.5.2 - Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

An examination committee conducts the Internal Assessment(IA) for all departments, and addresses issues pertaining to marks secured by students in exams or in attendance. Based on their scores in IA (best of two IAs), students can apply for the end-semester examination through the University's online examination portal. A student failing in a particular paper in both the IAs, are debarred from appearing the paper in the finals. The final examination comprises of 50 marks for subjects with practicals, and 70 marks for subjects without practicals. Marks from the IAs add up to the total score of the final exams.

Teachers or evaluators display the assessed answer sheets of IA in class, and discrepancies, if any, are addressed immediately. Generally, grievances regarding IAs are related to evaluation or mark entry, which requires re-examination and re-entry, and are easily solved as and when pointed out by any student. All procedures are transparent, and efficient. Students are informed about the examination process and code of conduct in advance. Following resolution of any concerns, a college representative submits internal exam marks online to the affiliating institution using the college's Login Id. Teachers from each department verify the marks while they are uploaded to the University's examination module. Any grievances related to mark uploading discrepancies are promptly addressed by the respective Departmental Heads, Principal's Office staff, and the university's Examination division.

- Two classrooms furnished with ICT facilities and overhead projectors. Additionally, these are used for meetings, workshops, seminars, and training sessions.
- One central computer lab (36 computers) and two departmental computer labs in Mathematics and Physics with internet access.
- Institutional Biotech Hub promoting biotechnology through training and workshops and serves as an additional laboratory for degree students.
- Free Wi-Fi available across the campus for students and staff.
- The Central Library having more than 28000 text and reference books and a browsing center having 10 computers with internet and access to various e-journals and e-books.
- 24-hour CCTV surveillance installed in various positions including classrooms for maintaining discipline and a peaceful learning environment.
- Generator with 62.5 KVA capacity ensures uninterrupted power supply during power cuts.

4.1.2 - The Institution has adequate facilities for cultural activities, sports, games (indoor, outdoor), gymnasium, yoga centre etc.

Some of the physical facilities for cultural and other activities are:

Sports facilities: The institution lacks a standard-sized playground for outdoor games. The open space at the front side and a wide and long lawn inside the main campus of the college are used for minor games. Additional sports facilities are accessible through various establishments, including the Stadium and Sports

Complex of the District Sports Association, Silchar Town Club playground, India Club, Police Parade Ground, and others. An initiative is in progress to develop a playground at the Women's Hostel campus.

Gymnasium: This facility has been utilised by the students under the supervision of Gym-instructor or Teacher-in-charge. Currently it is underutilized due to the absence of a Physical Instructor.

Facilities for Cultural activities: Cultural events usually take place in one of three large halls accommodating nearly 250 people. Besides, a mini auditorium with 100 seating capacity also serves the purpose. For larger events, temporary stages are set up on the campus lawn. A state-of-the-art auditorium with 300 capacity is under construction in the college campus.

Yoga Centre: Although lacking a permanent Yoga Centre, Yoga training is provided annually, facilitated by Dr. Sukhamoy Bhattacharjee, a renowned Yoga Teacher associated with the college for the past 40 years.

Canteen: The college canteen, run by a third party, provides food items at a subsidized rate. Separate sitting areas are available for students and staff.

Health Unit: The health unit room has all the necessary first aid facilities.

Library Management and library services require a series of works like acquiring, preparing, organizing and disseminating of collection/documents. With ICT, Libraries started automation for minimizing clerical routines and thereby optimizing productivity of Library.

2009 marked the inception of Library automation (partial) in Cachar College Silchar when ILMS Software for University Libraries (SOUL) was considered for Central Library. It is state-of-the-art integrated library management software designed and developed by the INFLIBNET Centre, Ahmadabad, Gujarat, based on requirements of college and university libraries. SOUL 1.0 Version was installed with 1 Server and 2 clients PC. Local Area Network (or Intranet)

was done in the Library with 7 point including Server. Cataloguing Module was used for data entry and around 18817 books have been entered by 2019 and access to OPAC was available for users

In 2020, SOUL Software was updated to SOUL2.0 to facilitate Library automation by including Membership Module and Circulation Module. New server and 3 clients PC have been made ready via Local Area Network (or Intranet). 20727 books have been entered till now. Students and Teachers can have the automation facility of Membership, Circulation & OPAC which will save time both of library staff and users.

The institution has continuously upgraded its IT facilities across the campus, ensuring seamless access for its users. Each department, library, and office is equipped with computers, software, and equipment tailored to their needs. Administrative and academic computers are equipped with necessary peripherals such as printers and scanners, all connected through Ethernet facilities.

The college gathers feedback online from students, alumni, and parents through Google Forms. The entire campus is Wi-Fi enabled, with bandwidth upgraded from 8 Mbps in 2018 to 100 Mbps in 2023. A biometric attendance system is used for staff and faculty, and there are three computer labs available for students and teachers.

Two smart classrooms equipped with smart boards, LCD projectors, and Ethernet facilities enhance the learning process. The college employs a computerized student management system for administrative purposes. The e-library boasts 10 computers connected to the internet, providing access to a wide range of e-

journals and e-books. The central library utilizes SOUL 2.0 for library automation.

Since the 2017-18 session, the college has shifted its admission process from physical to online mode using customized ERP software. Regular updates to Wi-Fi facilities ensure uninterrupted internet access.

4.4.2 - There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc.

Strategies for maintaining and utilizing physical facilities involve several key actions to ensure that the campus is well-maintained and functional. Adequate in-house staff are employed to meticulously maintain hygiene, cleanliness of Classrooms, Staffrooms, Seminar halls and Laboratories. The campus maintenance is monitored through CCTV surveillance. An electrician is appointed to oversee generator and electrical installations. Support facilities such as drinking water, canteen, and toilets are supervised by committees. Additionally, a college engineer oversees repair and maintenance work conducted by the Construction Committee.

Science departments maintain stock registers for equipment and consumables. New lab equipment, reagents, consumables etc. for each department of science stream are bought by seeking quotation from different firms as per requirements submitted by HoDs to the Principal. Laboratories are well-maintained by lab bearers under the supervision of department heads. Calibration, repair, and maintenance of sophisticated equipment are handled by technicians from respective suppliers and firms.

The library receives grants for book purchasesfrom ICPR, DHE and CIIL. The librarian seeks recommendation from departments beforepurchasing books. In case of general books, the library committeedecides. Attendance registers track library usage and the Soul 2.0 software manages data. Open access journal facilities are available in e-library.

Computersin centralized lab, departmental computer labs and elibrary are periodically updated and maintained through AMC. Every department have computers with ethernet connections and free Wi-Fi available across the campus for students and staff The sports committee oversees sports equipment maintenance, organizes sports events during social weekand ensures students participation in inter-college tournaments.

#### 6.4.3 - Institutional strategies for mobilization of funds and the optimal utilization of resources

Cachar College, a provincialized institution of the Government of Assam, faces limited flexibility in raising funds from students and other sources due to its status as a general degree college without accreditation from NAAC. Consequently, the institution has considered various approaches, such as requesting help from local MLAs, MPs, and government enterprises through their CSR programs.
