15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

Cachar College has been offering courses Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) and the National Education Policy 2020 (NEP-2020) structure for its TDC and FUYG programmes in science, arts, and commerce. With a strong emphasis on interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary education, the college ensures that students are equipped with the skills needed for the global job market and nurtures their interest in various fields through the following initiatives: The college itself is a multidisciplinary institution having natural science, social sciences, humanities, commerce and management, each offering multiple subjects. Under the CBCS system, it is compulsory for the students to study at least one Generic Elective (GE) subject, in a discipline different from their major. In the same manner, the Ability Enhancement Compulsory (AEC) course is a mandatory component of the curriculum for all students. As a part of which they study one language paper in first semester and Environmental Studies in the second semester. In the Four Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUGP), students must undertake three Interdisciplinary Course (IDC) papers: IDC-101, IDC-151, and IDC-201, in the first, second, and third semesters, respectively. In the FYUGP, along with IDC, a student majoring in a particular discipline (DSC) can choose ten Discipline Specific Minors (DSM), two Value-Added Courses (VAC), three Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC), and four Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC) in any discipline of their choice. Offerings of multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary subjects, along with VAC (Yoga, NCC, NSS, Understanding India and EVS), SEC, and AEC, is essential for holistic education, equipping our students for both their professional pursuits and advanced academic endeavors.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The implementation of the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) holds significant importance for the student community, particularly under the multiple entry and exit provisions outlined in the NEP 2020 guidelines. Over the past year, the affiliating University of Cachar College has mandated the creation of ABC IDs for all students

enrolled under the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) and the Four Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUP) as per NEP-2020 directives. This allows seamless credit transfer and accumulation across various courses, disciplines, and institutions.

17.Skill development:

Cachar College is committed to fostering holistic growth and equipping its students with essential skills for their professional and personal development. The college undertakes various skill development initiatives aimed at enhancing employability, entrepreneurship, and overall competence among students. Skill Paper in TDC: In the three-year degree course (TDC) it is compulsory to study two SEC papers for Honours students and four SEC papers for General students. Skill Paper in FYUGP: In the Four Year Undergraduate Programme (NEP 20220), it is compulsory for students to study three SEC theory papers along with practicals. Internship: In the FYUGP, internship with industry/ community engagement/ field studies is a vital and compulsory component of the curriculum (Semester 5). This complements academic learning by offering practical experiences that contribute to the holistic development of students' skills, preparing them for future career endeavors. Workshop and Training Programme: Additionally, students can hone their skills beyond academic boundaries through engagement in workshops, and training programmes offered by Cachar College. Some examples are: workshop on language and communication skills, workshop on ICT, workshop on life skills, etc. Mentor-Mentee Program: Under this initiative, students receive personalized guidance, enhancing their academic skills, emotional intelligence, and readiness for future challenges. Competitions: Organises intra and inter-college competitions to showcase talents, skills and enhance creativity.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

Efforts are consistently made by the college to incorporate Indian knowledge systems into the comprehensive growth of students. Though the medium of teaching is English, the College encourages bilingual teaching practices and integration of regional languages into classroom discussions. This not only preserves indigenous knowledge but also fosters a deeper understanding and appreciation of the subject matter. College has five well established language departments which are running courses on Arabic, Bengali, English, Hindi and Manipuri. The department of Sanskrit frequently organizes workshop on typing and speaking in Sanskrit. Through this initiative, the department endeavors to contribute towards the

preservation and promotion of Sanskrit as a living language in contemporary society. To promote the Indian Knowledge System, the college observes special days dedicated to commemorating and enriching our cultural and scientific heritage, such as International Yoga Day, Sharad Utsav, Holi, Teachers' Day, Hindi Divas, and more. Papers on Yoga and Understanding India as Value Added Courses (VAC) have been included in the latest curriculum (NEP-2020). This aims to offer students a comprehensive understanding of India's diverse cultural, historical, social, and political dimensions. The syllabi for English, Hindi, Sanskrit, Philosophy, Economics, and Bengali are enriched with a considerable number of topics pertaining to Indian culture and tradition. Each year, the Annual College Week function hosts cultural events that actively engage students in showcasing the vibrant diversity and traditions of Indian and North Eastern culture. Experts from diverse fields of Indian knowledge, including Sanskrit and classical arts are invited for special sessions to provide students with authentic learning experiences.

19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

In pursuit of excellence and continual improvement, our institution has embraced the paradigm of Outcome-Based Education (OBE) as a cornerstone of our educational philosophy. With a steadfast commitment to fostering holistic development and ensuring the relevance of our programs in a rapidly evolving world, College has prioritized the implementation of OBE principles across all academic disciplines through meticulous curriculum design. The Board of Under Graduate Studies (BUGS) of the affiliating university (Assam University, Silchar) comprising of faculty members from colleges and university design curriculum based on OBE principles as per NEP-2020. The course outcomes (COs) for all courses and programme outcomes (POs) are well structured in the curriculum designed as per NEP-2020. This curricular system also includes well defined papers such as Ability Enhancement Compulsory Course (AECC), and Skill Enhancement Course (SEC) that provide students skills to supplement what they learn from the core papers. Introduction of theory and practical papers on Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) in the Four Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUGP) further supports our commitment to OBE. To complete FYUGP, a particular student has to study three SEC papers. This ensures that students gain insight into industry expectations, enhance their employability skills, and effectively bridge skill gaps, thereby preparing them for the professional realm. Papers on NCC, NSS, Yoga, and Understanding India as Value Added Courses (VAC) within the OBS framework have been included in the curriculum. This aims to: (1) foster leadership, teamwork,

discipline, and social service skills, (2) promote mental, physical, and spiritual well-being, and (3) offer students a comprehensive understanding of India's diverse cultural, historical, social, and political dimensions. College is planning to introduce a significant number of add-on courses as per the demand of students and local industries in the next academic session. Curricula are periodically revised to align with industry standards and societal needs by collecting feedback from stakeholders, including students, alumni, and employers.

20.Distance education/online education:

Through its focus on distance and online education, Cachar College demonstrates its commitment to inclusive and lifelong learning opportunities for all. Cachar College hosts the Study Centre of Krishna Kanta Handique State Open University (KKHSOU), offering a variety of undergraduate and postgraduate courses through Open & Distance Learning. Aligned with the guidelines of the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 and prioritizing accessibility, equity, and quality, students can earn credits by completing quality-assured online programmes available on platforms (eg. SWAYAM) endorsed by the regulatory body from time to time. The college is equipped with technological infrastructure to support teaching and learning for online and distance courses. Significant numbers of classrooms are equipped with projection systems and internet facility, for conducting classes/lectures in online/virtual platforms. The campus provides free internet service, facilitating easy access to educational portals. Campus-wide WiFi facility further enables students to access open learning resources conveniently from any location within the college premises. Encouraging a dynamic academic environment, the college actively promotes faculty-led seminars, conferences, and talks in online or blended mode. A significant number of the faculty has undergone successful faculty development programs on online platforms to enhance their teaching methodologies. Looking ahead, the college is strategizing to introduce a diverse range of add-on courses in the online mode, reflecting its commitment to adapt and evolve in the educational landscape.

- 1. Define Learning Objectives: The learning objectives for each course or subject are clearly outlined, specifying the knowledge, skills, competencies, and attitudes that students are expected to develop by the end of the course.
- 2. Develop Curriculum: As an affiliated institution, Cachar College adheres to and implements the curriculum prescribed by Assam University, Silchar.
- 3. Instructional Strategies: Departments employ various strategies such as classroom teaching, interactive sessions, group discussions and collaborative projects, as well as problem-based learning approaches to enhance student engagement and deepen

understanding of the subject matter. However, the choice of instructional strategies depends on subject or course.

- 4. Monitor and Evaluate: Regular monitoring and evaluation are conducted to ensure that the curriculum is being delivered effectively. This includes internal assessment, term-end examination and analyzing student performance data, and making necessary adjustments in the instructional strategies.
- 5. Document and Communicate: The curriculum delivery process is meticulously documented and effectively communicated to students, teachers, and administrators, encompassing the sharing of curriculum details, lesson plans, worksheets, and other learning materials, along with timely updates or modifications to ensure transparency and alignment.

1.1.2 - The institution adheres to the academic calendar including for the conduct of Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE)

The institution follows the academic calendar of the college, including the schedules for internal evaluations, as per the regulations and directives from the affiliating university. The academic calendar consists of 241working days, starting in August each year, with tentative schedules for internal and term-end examinations and holidays. The institution conducts at least two mandatory unit tests in each semester and submits the best mark to the university within the stipulated date. The admission of FYUGP first-semester students is completed before July, and other semester admissions are generally completed within seven days after the semester-end exams. The odd semester classes start in the first week of August, and even semester classes start after the completion of odd semester exams. The institution takes special care of weak and needy students. The institution strictly follows the relevant rules and regulations for examinations to curb unfair means. The internal examinations for morning and

dayshift students are held in the same sitting, and internal marks are uploaded to the university's web portal. Attendance is vital, and the institution follows the affiliating university's attendance rules, with provisions for awarding marks in practical exams based on attendance percentage.

Environment studies: All UG programs contain a mandatary course on Environmental Studies. Also, Zoology and Botany cover several topics on environment and sustainability in their course content. Integrating these crosscutting issues into the curriculum can help students develop a more holistic understanding of the world around them, and better prepare them for their future roles as professionals and global citizens.

Gender: Course content of English, Bengali, Manipuri and Sanskrit Honours and Pass include texts dealing with issues like gender discrimination, status of woman in society, women's right and gender equality. The syllabus of Political Science and Philosophy also incorporates topics on women in politics, gender justice, feminist ethics etc.

Human values and ethics: These topics are incorporated in the syllabus of Philosophy and Sanskrit. Professional ethics are a part of the curriculum of Commerce UG Course which deals with entrepreneurship development, goal setting- problems and prospects, role of regulatory institutions, challenges in financial management and their solutions.

In addressing the needs of slower learners, teachers implement departmental remedial measures and these involve arranging special classes and offering guidance on effective exam strategies to ensure students can achieve passing grades in their subjects. Advanced learners are encouraged to pursue excellence in their academic pursuits. Teachers provide guidance and support to those interested in specialized studies or training, facilitating their participation in advanced programs or courses offered by nationally recognized laboratories or institutes. Additionally, motivated students are mentored to prepare for various competitive examinations such as GATE, JAM, CAT, APSC, UPSC, NET, SLET, BANKPO, among others.

To recognize and incentivize academic achievement, certificates and cash prizes are awarded to the top graduates and semester achievers across all disciplines during the annual award ceremony, fostering a culture of continuous academic pursuit and excellence.

From the current academic sesion, IQAC has taken a novel initiative to support the slow and advanced learners through "PRAGATI" (Personalised Remedial, Advanced Guidance and Adaptive Teaching For Improvement)

As per CBCS & FYUGPcurriculum, the College generally conducts two Internal Assessment (IA)/ Unit Test per semester as a part of Continuous & Comprehensive Assessment (CCA) either online or offline mode as decided by Examination Committee. Out of two IAs, the best score is considered for addition to the final results.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching-learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

The college offers a range of well-maintained facilities to support teaching, learning, and research. There are 20 well-furnished classrooms equipped with green/white boards, adequate furniture, and raised platforms. Additionally, 10 departmental classrooms are available, including one each for Chemistry, Industrial Fish & Fisheries, Mathematics, and Statistics, and two each for Zoology, Botany, and Physics. Eight departments have

departmental bookshelves for regular use by teachers and students. The institution boasts 12 well-equipped science laboratories for its seven science departments, with essential safety measures such as fire extinguishers, first-aid boxes, and safety guidelines displayed in each lab. Zoology and Botany departments have individual museums catering to their specific teaching and learning needs.

Two classrooms are equipped with ICT facilities and overhead projectors, doubling as venues for meetings, workshops, seminars, and training sessions. A central computer lab with 36 computers and two departmental labs in Mathematics and Physics provide internet access. The Institutional Biotech Hub promotes biotechnology through training and workshops while serving as an additional lab for degree students. Free Wi-Fi is accessible across the campus for students and staff. The Central Library houses over 28,000 text and reference books and includes a browsing center with 10 computers offering internet access and e-resources. To ensure discipline and a safe learning environment, 24-hour CCTV surveillance is installed in classrooms and key areas. Additionally, a 62.5 KVA generator ensures uninterrupted power supply during outages.

4.1.2 - The Institution has adequate facilities for cultural activities, sports, games (indoor, outdoor), gymnasium, yoga centre etc.

The college does not have a standard-sized playground for outdoor games, but minor games are played in an open space at the front and on a 1,500 sq. ft. lawn within the campus. Additional sports facilities are accessed through venues such as the District Sports Association Stadium, Silchar Town Club playground, India Club, and Police Parade Ground. Efforts are underway to develop a playground at the Women's Hostel campus.

A gymnasium is available for students, previously utilized under the supervision of a gym instructor or teacher-in-charge. However, it is currently underutilized due to the lack of a dedicated Physical Instructor. Cultural events are hosted in three large halls, each with a seating capacity of 250. A mini auditorium accommodating 100 people is also available, while temporary stages are set up on the campus lawn for larger events. A modern, state-of-the-art auditorium with a 300-seat capacity is currently under construction to enhance cultural facilities.

Although the college does not have a permanent Yoga Centre, annual Yoga training is conducted by Dr. Sukhamoy Bhattacharjee, a renowned Yoga teacher associated with the institution for over 40 years.

4.2 - Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1 - Library is automated using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS)

Library management involves acquiring, preparing, organizing, and disseminating collections or documents. With advancements in ICT, libraries began automating tasks to reduce clerical routines and boost productivity.

In 2009, Cachar College Silchar initiated partial library automation by adopting the SOUL (Software for University Libraries) system developed by INFLIBNET Centre, Ahmadabad, Gujarat. SOUL 1.0 was installed on a server with two client PCs, connected via a seven-point Local Area Network (Intranet). The Cataloguing Module was used for data entry, enabling the library to catalog approximately 18,817 books by 2019. Additionally, users were granted access to the Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC).

In 2020, the library upgraded to SOUL 2.0 to enhance automation. The upgrade introduced the Membership and Circulation Modules, supported by a new server and three client PCs, all integrated via the LAN. The library has since cataloged 20,727 books, providing students and faculty with streamlined membership, circulation, and OPAC services. These advancements significantly save time for both library staff and users, improving overall efficiency and accessibility.

ensuring seamless access across the campus. Departments, the library, and administrative offices are equipped with computers, software, and peripherals such as printers and scanners, all connected via Ethernet for efficient operations.

Feedback from students, alumni, and parents is collected online through Google Forms. The campus is fully Wi-Fi enabled, with bandwidth increased from 8 Mbps in 2018 to 100 Mbps in 2023. A biometric attendance system is implemented for staff and faculty, and three computer labs are available for students and teachers.

Smart classrooms equipped with smart boards, LCD projectors, and Ethernet facilities enhance the teaching-learning experience. A computerized student management system is utilized for administrative tasks, while the e-library, with 10 internetenabled computers, provides access to e-journals and e-books. The central library is automated with SOUL 2.0 software.

Since the 2017-18 academic session, the college has shifted its admission process to an online mode using customized ERP software. Regular updates to Wi-Fi facilities ensure uninterrupted internet connectivity, supporting both academic and administrative needs.

Dedicated in-house staff maintain the hygiene and cleanliness of classrooms, staffrooms, seminar halls, and laboratories, while campus upkeep is monitored through CCTV surveillance. An appointed electrician oversees generator operations and electrical installations, and committees supervise essential support facilities such as drinking water, canteens, and toilets. Additionally, a college engineer coordinates repair and maintenance work under the Construction Committee's guidance.

Science departments maintain detailed stock registers for equipment and consumables. Procurement of lab equipment, reagents, and other necessities follows a quotation process based on departmental requirements submitted by HoDs to the Principal. Laboratories are managed by lab bearers under the supervision of department heads, with technicians from suppliers handling calibration, repairs, and maintenance of sophisticated equipment.

The library receives grants from ICPR, DHE, and CIIL for book purchases. Recommendations for new books are sought from departments, with the Library Committee deciding on general acquisitions. Library usage is tracked through attendance registers, while SOUL 2.0 software manages data. The e-library provides open access to journals and e-resources.

Computers in the central lab, departmental labs, and the e-library are maintained and updated. The internet and Wi-Fi facilities available throughout the campus.

The Sports Committee manages sports equipment, organizes events during social week, and ensures student participation in intercollege tournaments.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching-learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

The college offers a range of well-maintained facilities to support teaching, learning, and research. There are 20 well-furnished classrooms equipped with green/white boards, adequate furniture, and raised platforms. Additionally, 10 departmental classrooms are available, including one each for Chemistry, Industrial Fish & Fisheries, Mathematics, and Statistics, and two each for Zoology, Botany, and Physics. Eight departments have departmental bookshelves for regular use by teachers and students. The institution boasts 12 well-equipped science laboratories for its seven science departments, with essential safety measures such as fire extinguishers, first-aid boxes, and safety guidelines displayed in each lab. Zoology and Botany

departments have individual museums catering to their specific teaching and learning needs.

Two classrooms are equipped with ICT facilities and overhead projectors, doubling as venues for meetings, workshops, seminars, and training sessions. A central computer lab with 36 computers and two departmental labs in Mathematics and Physics provide internet access. The Institutional Biotech Hub promotes biotechnology through training and workshops while serving as an additional lab for degree students. Free Wi-Fi is accessible across the campus for students and staff. The Central Library houses over 28,000 text and reference books and includes a browsing center with 10 computers offering internet access and e-resources. To ensure discipline and a safe learning environment, 24-hour CCTV surveillance is installed in classrooms and key areas. Additionally, a 62.5 KVA generator ensures uninterrupted power supply during outages.

4.1.2 - The Institution has adequate facilities for cultural activities, sports, games (indoor, outdoor), gymnasium, yoga centre etc.

The college does not have a standard-sized playground for outdoor games, but minor games are played in an open space at the front and on a 1,500 sq. ft. lawn within the campus. Additional sports facilities are accessed through venues such as the District Sports Association Stadium, Silchar Town Club playground, India Club, and Police Parade Ground. Efforts are underway to develop a playground at the Women's Hostel campus.

A gymnasium is available for students, previously utilized under the supervision of a gym instructor or teacher-in-charge. However, it is currently underutilized due to the lack of a dedicated Physical Instructor.

Cultural events are hosted in three large halls, each with a seating capacity of 250. A mini auditorium accommodating 100 people is also available, while temporary stages are set up on the campus lawn for larger events. A modern, state-of-the-art

auditorium with a 300-seat capacity is currently under construction to enhance cultural facilities.

Although the college does not have a permanent Yoga Centre, annual Yoga training is conducted by Dr. Sukhamoy Bhattacharjee, a renowned Yoga teacher associated with the institution for over 40 years.

4.2 - Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1 - Library is automated using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS)

Library management involves acquiring, preparing, organizing, and disseminating collections or documents. With advancements in ICT, libraries began automating tasks to reduce clerical routines and boost productivity.

In 2009, Cachar College Silchar initiated partial library automation by adopting the SOUL (Software for University Libraries) system developed by INFLIBNET Centre, Ahmadabad, Gujarat. SOUL 1.0 was installed on a server with two client PCs, connected via a seven-point Local Area Network (Intranet). The Cataloguing Module was used for data entry, enabling the library to catalog approximately 18,817 books by 2019. Additionally, users were granted access to the Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC).

In 2020, the library upgraded to SOUL 2.0 to enhance automation. The upgrade introduced the Membership and Circulation Modules, supported by a new server and three client PCs, all integrated via the LAN. The library has since cataloged 20,727 books, providing students and faculty with streamlined membership, circulation, and OPAC services. These advancements significantly save time for both library staff and users, improving overall efficiency and accessibility.

4.3 - IT Infrastructure

4.3.1 - Institution frequently updates its IT facilities including Wi-Fi

The institution has consistently upgraded its IT infrastructure, ensuring seamless access across the campus. Departments, the library, and administrative offices are equipped with computers, software, and peripherals such as printers and scanners, all connected via Ethernet for efficient operations.

Feedback from students, alumni, and parents is collected online through Google Forms. The campus is fully Wi-Fi enabled, with bandwidth increased from 8 Mbps in 2018 to 100 Mbps in 2023. A biometric attendance system is implemented for staff and faculty, and three computer labs are available for students and teachers.

Smart classrooms equipped with smart boards, LCD projectors, and Ethernet facilities enhance the teaching-learning experience. A computerized student management system is utilized for administrative tasks, while the e-library, with 10 internet-enabled computers, provides access to e-journals and e-books. The central library is automated with SOUL 2.0 software.

Since the 2017-18 academic session, the college has shifted its admission process to an online mode using customized ERP software. Regular updates to Wi-Fi facilities ensure uninterrupted internet connectivity, supporting both academic and administrative needs.

4.4.2 - There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc.

The institution employs various strategies to maintain and effectively utilize its physical facilities, ensuring a well-functioning and clean campus environment. Dedicated in-house staff maintain the hygiene and cleanliness of classrooms, staffrooms, seminar halls, and laboratories, while campus upkeep is monitored through CCTV surveillance. An appointed electrician oversees generator operations and electrical installations, and committees supervise essential support facilities such as drinking water, canteens, and toilets. Additionally, a college engineer coordinates repair and maintenance work under the Construction Committee's guidance.

Science departments maintain detailed stock registers for equipment and consumables. Procurement of lab equipment, reagents, and other necessities follows a quotation process based on departmental requirements submitted by HoDs to the Principal. Laboratories are managed by lab bearers under the supervision of department heads, with technicians from suppliers handling calibration, repairs, and maintenance of sophisticated equipment.

The library receives grants from ICPR, DHE, and CIIL for book purchases. Recommendations for new books are sought from departments, with the Library Committee deciding on general acquisitions. Library usage is tracked through attendance registers, while SOUL 2.0 software manages data. The e-library provides open access to journals and e-resources.

Computers in the central lab, departmental labs, and the elibrary are maintained and updated. The internet and Wi-Fi facilities available throughout the campus.

The Sports Committee manages sports equipment, organizes events during social week, and ensures student participation in intercollege tournaments.
